- My name is Raelene Martin and it is my honor to address you on behalf of the International Chamber of Commerce – the largest business organization, representing millions of companies, of all sizes and sectors in over 100 countries, including small and medium enterprises that are the lynchpin of the global economy.
- Let me start by extending our sincere thanks to the INC Secretariat for their efforts in preparing this first INC meeting and Multistakeholder Forum, and to the Government of Uruguay for hosting us in this beautiful city.
- We heartily congratulate the Executive Secretary of the INC and the newly appointed Chair of the bureau for their appointments, and reiterate our full support as the business community to work alongside you all -- the UNEP Secretariat, all countries and stakeholders for the imperative charge and task that lies ahead, and as we seize the opportunity for collective action and meaningful change.

- A coordinated, concerted and holistic approach with respect to design, use and reuse of plastics, that is based on a common vision and shared global goal will be critically needed.
- We believe that multistakeholder engagement can help member states to secure and implement the deal, and that all businesses - large and small, from all sectors and geographies have a critical role to play in supporting member states with expertise and the solutions to tackle the challenge of plastic pollution, at the required scale and speed across its entire value chains.
- We acknowledge, and greatly welcome the recognition of business as a key stakeholder in the process as well as the implementation of the instrument.

We agree of course than an effective treaty should address the full life cycle of plastics, including upstream and downstream measures, with particular focus on reduction, reuse, recovery and recycling. A balance of legally binding and voluntary elements for effective implementation and broad participation will be critical.

We all know much work still remains to be done to ensure that we achieve the objective we want to attain.

Let us build on the achievements made at this meeting, the partnerships and collaborations created and together speed up and advance the critical work towards an ambitious treaty to end plastic pollution.
